Strange and stressful times we're living in.

It's early April and we're living in a mandated stay-at-home order. We closed our thrift store on March 17 and shut the shelter to public access shortly after. Pagosa Springs, which would normally have been crowded with spring break visitors the last three weeks of March, more closely resembled a ghost town than a bustling tourist destination. That's a good thing given the current state of the world.

Coronavirus has definitely disrupted animal shelters around the country, and HSPS is no different. Many shelters are closed to the public and working with limited services. Calls for more foster homes have gone out in anticipation of an influx of abandoned and surrendered animals when the full impact of lost jobs and diminished wages hits. And it all coincides with the coming of spring when the arrival of litters of unwanted kittens and puppies at animal shelters tends to increase anyway.

But it's not all bleak. Even with restricted access and the limits of sheltering in place and social distancing, HSPS adoption numbers are actually up, for now, and applications for fostering have increased. Maybe it's the realization that the best possible quarantine buddy imaginable is just down the road at the animal shelter. But whatever it is, the response and concern shown for shelter animals has been very real and very gratifying.

With businesses closed and social gatherings prohibited, the parameters of our daily routines have shrunk to the size of one's home and its inhabitants. And



while some people unfortunately have to ride this distancing journey in isolation, others of us are fortunate to have loved ones – including the fur and feather variety – to share our home and ease the strain of uncertainty. Quarantine buddies are indeed good companions.

My human kids have been out of the home for years now, one a few hours away in Colorado and the other thousands of miles away in Australia. We stay in touch through technology, but it's not the same as sharing a living space. Thank goodness my wife and I have five furry adopted shelter kids three dogs and two cats – to brighten our days, especially in uncertain times. Their presence in the home adds a unique layer of richness to what otherwise might seem repetitive and restrictive as the days tick by. Daily explorations in the national forest with my wife and the dogs and couch cuddles with the cats are essential for mental maintenance right now.

In animal sheltering we often discuss the many benefits our efforts have for the animals in our care. But the relationship between a shelter animal and an adopter is definitely a two-way street, and our pets can truly be a source of solace and comfort in challenging times. Tail wags and purrs are especially meaningful under current circumstances and even a bit more magical than usual.

With life as we've known it on hold for a while, it might be good, maybe even illuminating, to appreciate anew the simple and multiple joys that adopted pets bring to our daily lives. What better way to do that than to share just a few of the email, phone, and Facebook messages we've received from adopters over the past year or two. Here at the Humane Society of Pagosa Springs, we share everyone's concern about the safety, health and well-being of our wonderful community, which includes our stray, abandoned and homeless cats and dogs.

I want to assure you that over the last few weeks, the staff at our animal shelter has continued our essential lifesaving work, tirelessly caring for the animals in our community who need help.

With the outbreak of COVID-19, and to keep our staff, volunteers and community members healthy and safe, we have had to close our thrift store and drastically limit public services at our animal shelter. Both facilities provide the critical funds necessary to sustain our organization.

To make matters more challenging, spring is one of our busiest seasons as every year we see a tsunami of kittens and puppies brought to our shelter. Even with restricted shelter access, we are continuing to take in stray and abandoned cats and dogs, and staff is still working with qualified adopters, by appointment only, to keep finding forever homes for these deserving animals. We are in urgent need of your support now more than ever!

We can't do this alone, but we also understand that many of you may be financially burdened at this difficult time. That's why we are not asking for much...

If you have the financial means, please consider making a special COVID-19 resiliency donation to help us overcome the financial loss we will endure during this unprecedented challenge.

The long-term impact of COVID-19 on our ability to serve the community and its pets is unknown at this time. What we do know is that we will not waiver in our commitment to provide what every animal in our community needs and deserves – shelter, food, love and quality care.

Temporary Changes in HSPS Operations

Thrift Store Closure. As the looming impact of the spreading coronavirus became very apparent in mid-March, HSPS administration made the decision to close the thrift store on March 17 to ensure the safety and health of our store employees. This move predated the governor's stay-at-home mandate and closure of non-essential business in the state by approximately a week.

We closed the store just as the influx of out of town spring break visitors was about to peak, sacrificing a considerable amount of potential revenue but sparing our employees from interacting with numerous customers from locations where the virus was already establishing itself. We'd rather be "safe than sorry."

Our thrift store is the major revenue

generator for HSPS. Store revenues support all facets of animal shelter operations. The store will remain closed while restrictions are in place. The economic hardship of being closed



is real, but the social reality is that being closed protects the health of our staff and contributes to stemming the spread of COVID-19 in our community.

With all the dogs and cats in residence closing the animal shelter was neither desirable nor feasible. Nevertheless, it was paramount that we take immediate steps to protect the safety of our shelter staff so that they could remain healthy and continue to deliver daily care to the animals.

Revised Adoption Services. We've adopted limited services and closed the shelter to public access. People can no longer tour the shelter and browse the animals. Adoptions continue, but they are by appointment only for pre-approved adopters. All adoptable animals are

available for preview online, and we frequently feature adoptable animals in Instagram and Facebook posts to keep the public aware.

Emergency Foster Care. We also put out a call for emergency foster homes in the event we need to drastically reduce the shelter population due to staff illness or to address a large influx of new animals as a consequence of COVID-19. The response to our foster home request was immediate and significant, and it is reassuring to know that we have people and homes available if the need arises.

Revised Shelter Staff Scheduling.

Shelter staff schedules have also been restructured. Because the shelter is staffed every day of the year, staff schedules typically overlap, and virtually all staff

members work
with every other
shelter employee
at some point
during the week.
To avoid cross
contaminating
all the staff if one
employee contracts
COVID-19, shelter
staff have been
divided into two
discrete teams that
never overlap. One
team works four

consecutive days and the other works three consecutive days, with a lot of cleaning, disinfecting and sterilization at the beginning and end of each shift.

This temporary schedule necessitated some reduction in hours for our full-time employees, but because the reduction was approved through the Colorado Work-Share program the economic impact for each employee is much less than it otherwise would be. We are sincerely grateful for the willingness of our shelter staff to do what is necessary to ensure that we can continue to deliver quality care to the entire shelter animal population.

How long these changes will continue is hard to predict. Our hope is that we can ease some restrictions in the not-toodistant future. This is uncharted territory and the challenges are unprecedented so decision-making must remain fluid. Our job is to process the information coming our way and make the decisions ultimately deemed best for the animals in our care.

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Major Date Changes to Fundraising Events: Auction Moves to September

Best laid plans and all that...it's about staying smart and flexible in the time of COVID-19. We had planned to kick off the new decade with a new wrinkle to our two biggest fundraising events in 2020 by moving the Auction for the Animals from its traditional late August time frame to late June and bumping the Chocolate and Decadent Delights Auction from mid-March to early October. Our new wrinkle just got crinkled!

It's hard to predict, let alone know, how the next several months will play out, but in response to the serious nature of the coronavirus we've rescheduled this year's fundraising events. Our annual Auction for the Animals has been moved from June 27 to Saturday, September 12, still at the Ross Aragon Community Center in Pagosa Springs. It remains to be seen if social gatherings will be permitted or practical, so stay tuned for further auction updates as the year unfolds. Because the Chocolate and Decadent Delights Auction would then occur only three weeks later, it has been postponed for now and might be on hiatus until 2021. Time will tell.

The Auction for the Animals is our major fundraiser each year, and while the Chocolate and Decadent Delights

auction plays country cousin to the big auction it still contributes significantly to our fundraising bottom line. The revenues normally generated by these two events are truly the difference makers in our ability to operate the shelter at full capacity and support our many service programs to the extent the community is accustomed. If your circumstances permit, we would sincerely appreciate whatever support you can send to help us care for the shelter animals and provide the safe haven so many community animals need.
